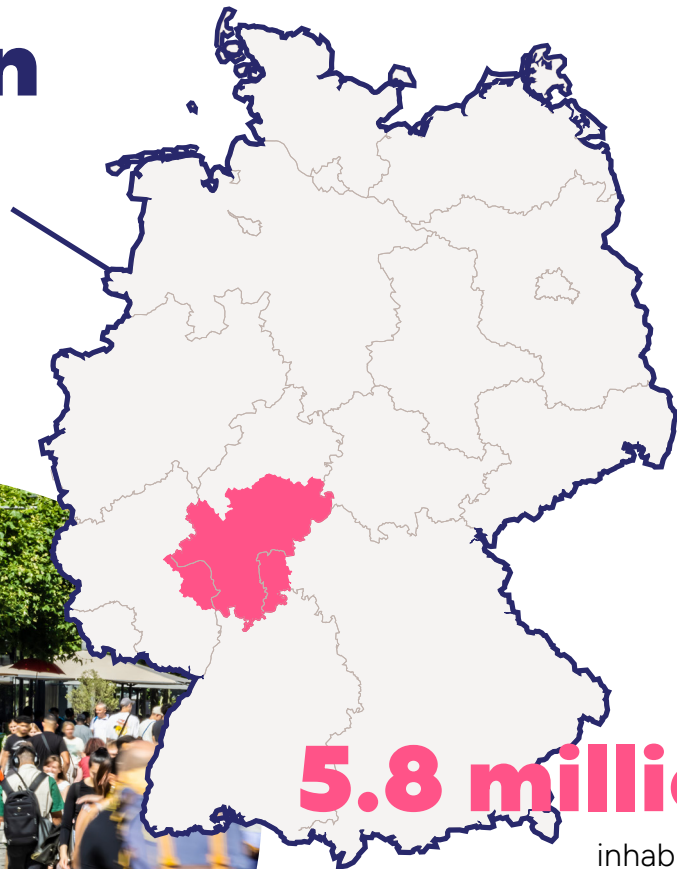

Metropolitan regions exert a powerful attraction on people. They are centres of change that open up new opportunities. FrankfurtRheinMain is popular both nationally and internationally as a place to live, study, and work. People from over 180 nations live together in our metropolitan region. While population density is 233 per square kilometre across Germany, it is as high as 394 per square kilometre in FrankfurtRheinMain. In the core cities of Aschaffenburg, Darmstadt, Frankfurt am Main, Mainz, Offenbach am Main, and Wiesbaden, the average population density is as high as 2,092 per square kilometre.

Where so many different people come together in close proximity, entirely new ideas emerge. It is therefore no coincidence that FrankfurtRheinMain is home to numerous global market

leaders and hidden champions as well as renowned universities, internationally recognised research institutes, and major national and European institutions.

Although FrankfurtRheinMain accounts for only around 4% of the total area of Germany, it generated 8.3% of German gross value added (GVA) in 2022. This is driven not only by the many domestic and international companies based here but also by the growing number of employees subject to social security contributions. Although our metropolitan region has a higher proportion of settlement and transport areas than Germany as a whole, it is remarkably green. Workplaces, friends and family, leisure activities and excursion destinations: in FrankfurtRheinMain, everything is close at hand.

Central transport and logistics hub: FrankfurtRheinMain is a gateway to the world

Transport routes are the lifelines of a business location: They connect the urban centres and rural areas of the region and link FrankfurtRheinMain with destinations in Germany and abroad. FrankfurtRheinMain is one of the most important transport hubs in Germany and Europe. In our metropolitan region, people and goods reliably reach their destinations.

2.6 million commuters

travelled daily on the roads and railways of the Rhine-Main area in 2024. Efficient mobility is a key factor in enabling people to commute between home and work whenever remote working is not an option. FrankfurtRheinMain is a region of short distances. A dense road and rail network combined with a well-developed public transport system connects our metropolitan region. In addition to daily commuters, business travellers, tourists, and commercial and delivery traffic can also rely on quickly reaching their destinations.



61.6 million passengers

travelled through Frankfurt Airport in 2024. This represents an increase of **3.7%** compared with the previous year and accounts for **29.1%** of all passengers at German commercial airports. Frankfurt Airport is the leading cargo airport and the sixth-largest passenger airport in Europe. It is the global leader in hub connectivity. In 2024, **99** airlines served **311** destinations in **98** countries from Frankfurt. With Frankfurt Airport, Frankfurt-RheinMain enjoys a key locational advantage from which companies in our metropolitan region benefit both directly and indirectly.

and well over **1,000** trains used Frankfurt Central Station every day in 2024. It is one of the most important rail hubs in Germany and connects FrankfurtRheinMain with national and international destinations. Passengers can access Intercity (IC), Intercity-Express (ICE), Interregio, and EuroCity (EC) services at **18** stations across the metropolitan region. Amsterdam, Berlin, Hamburg, Cologne, Leipzig, Stuttgart, Milan, Munich, Paris, or Zurich – from FrankfurtRheinMain, major cities in Germany and across Europe are within easy reach by train or car.



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Inland ports

are located in the Rhine-Main area. Goods are handled not only at Frankfurt Airport and the freight terminals of our metropolitan region but also at the inland ports in Aschaffenburg, Frankfurt am Main (three ports), Hanau, Gernsheim, and Mainz. The Rhine is the busiest inland waterway in the world. With the Rhine and the Main, two of the most important inland waterways in Europe run directly through our metropolitan region. Both rivers connect the inland ports in Frankfurt-RheinMain with the seaports in the Netherlands. Heading south, vessels can reach the Black Sea via the Main-Danube Canal.

cross the Frankfurter Kreuz interchange every day. It is one of the busiest road junctions in Europe. Numerous federal motorways, including major European transport corridors such as the A7, A5, A3, A45, and A67, intersect in FrankfurtRheinMain.



Major business meeting point and international trading hub

As the geographical centre of Germany and Europe, FrankfurtRheinMain has long been a traditional centre for trade and trade fairs. Frankfurt am Main in particular has been a place of free trade for many centuries. Trade fairs have been documented in the Main metropolis since 1150. The Frankfurt Trade Fair quickly developed into one of the most important trade fairs in Europe.

Not only leading trade fairs, but also important congresses, exhibitions and events attract large flows of visitors to our metropolitan region – including, for example, the See-Conference, one of the largest creative conferences in Germany, the Real Estate Congress Frankfurt-RheinMain baut!, the German Mobility Congress and the Impact Festival, Europe's largest B2B event for sustainable innovations.



207 trade fairs, exhibitions, congresses, and events

are held at the Frankfurt exhibition centre alone each year. In 2024, **1,066,673** visitors – **500,850** from abroad – attended to see **35,870** exhibitors, **26,361** of whom travelled from abroad to present to an international audience. In total, the Frankfurt exhibition centre offers **1,113,019 m²** of net exhibition space, including special display areas. Messe Frankfurt also organises **107** events abroad each year. In addition to the Frankfurt exhibition centre, numerous other trade fair, congress, and event venues across our metropolitan region bring together people from around the world.

These include the House of Finance, the House of Digital Transformation, the House of Logistics and Mobility (HOLM), and the House of Pharma & Healthcare.

Other well-known institutions in our metropolitan region include ATHENE National Research Centre for Applied Cybersecurity, the German Research Centre for Artificial Intelligence, and the German Meteorological Service.

In addition to academic education, vocational training offers the opportunity for an independent life with strong career prospects. FrankfurtRheinMain has around **11,500** training companies in the skilled trades sector and around **11,200** training companies in the commercial and industrial sector.

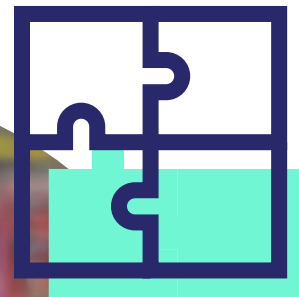

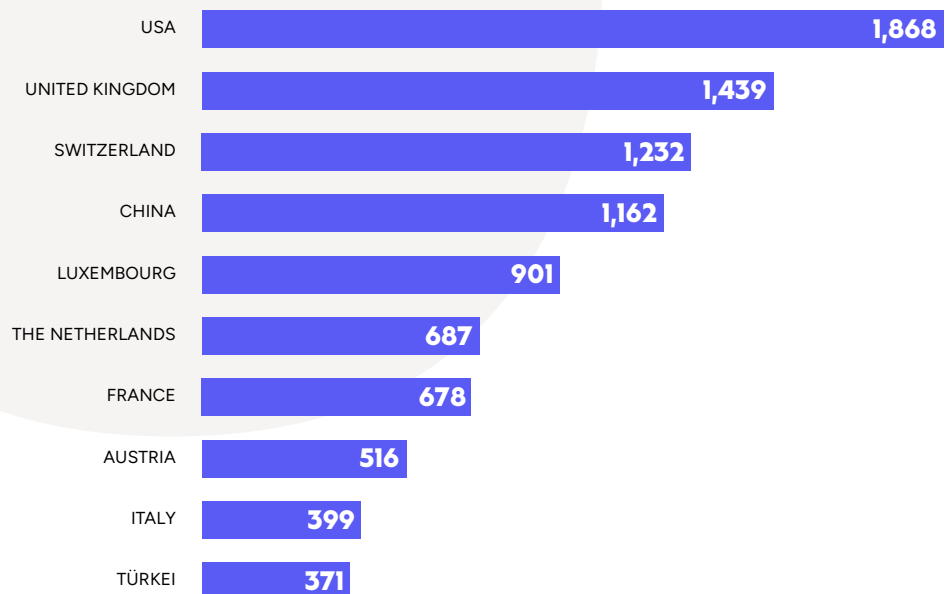

support start-ups in turning their business ideas into reality within our metropolitan region. These include TechQuartier in Frankfurt am Main, which supports the development of the FrankfurtRheinMain region as a central FinTech hub in Germany and Europe, the HUB31 Technology and Start-up Centre in Darmstadt, which provides office and workshop space for technology-oriented start-ups; Heimathafen in Wiesbaden, which supports impact-driven start-ups, InnovationLabz in Mainz, which offers laboratory and office space for biotechnology, pharmaceutical, and life sciences companies, and the Digital Start-up Centre Aschaffenburg, which focuses on digital and innovative business models.

573,000

hectares of forest and recreational areas

For those wishing to get out into nature: Nature parks and local recreation areas such as the Odenwald, the Spessart, the Taunus, and the Vogelsberg volcanic region are close by. A walk through the idyllic vineyards of the Rheingau or along the Bergstraße can be followed by a tasting of regional wines. Variety and enjoyment are also guaranteed by the culinary offerings of our metropolitan region. These range from authentic restaurants serving regional specialities such as apple wine, Frankfurter sausages, and Handkäse (sour milk cheese) to exclusive bars and clubs to international street food.



In addition, the wide range of leisure activities in FrankfurtRheinMain includes wellness and cultural experiences. Relaxation is offered by the Rhein-Main thermal bath in Hofheim, the Jugendstilbad thermal bath in Darmstadt, and the Kaiser-Friedrich thermal bath in Wiesbaden, among others. Opera, ballet, theatre, concerts, and festivals enrich the events calendar of our metropolitan region alongside the many exhibitions in museums and art galleries.

the tallest completed skyscraper in Frankfurt am Main is the Commerzbank Tower. It is also the tallest skyscraper in Germany and ranks among the highest in Europe. The skyline is undoubtedly an architectural highlight of the Main metropolis. There are also many historic squares and landmarks, including the New Frankfurt Old Town (Dom-Römer Quarter) and St Paul's Church, where the first German National Assembly met and drafted a constitution that later served as an important foundation for the current Basic Law of the Federal Republic of Germany. The Peter Behrens Building is a jewel of Expressionist architecture in the Höchst Industrial Park. The building of the former chemical conglomerate I.G. Farben now forms part of the Westend campus of Goethe University Frankfurt am Main.

Other notable architectural and religious buildings in FrankfurtRheinMain:

Schloss Johannisburg in Aschaffenburg – until 1803, the second residence of the Archbishops and Electors of Mainz • **Pompejanum in Aschaffenburg** – an ideal reconstruction of a Roman villa • **Schloss Bad Homburg** – residence of the Landgraves of Hesse-Homburg until 1866 and thereafter, the summer residence of the Prussian kings and German emperors • **Residenzschloss Darmstadt** – built in the Renaissance style by Remy de la Fosse between 1716 and 1727 • **Baroque Quarter in Fulda** with Dom St. Salvator and the Stadtschloss – a magnificent residence for the Prince Abbots and Prince Bishops of Fulda • **Michaelskirche in Fulda** – one of the oldest churches in Germany • **Schloss Philippsruhe in Hanau** – the oldest Baroque palace east of the Rhine built in the French style • **Hoher Dom zu Limburg** – a masterpiece of Late Romanesque architecture and cathedral of the Diocese of Limburg • **Hoher Dom St. Martin zu Mainz (Mainzer Dom)** – a landmark of Romanesque architecture with more than 1,000 years of history as the episcopal church of the city • **St. Stephan Mainz** – choir with Chagall windows • **Dom St. Peter zu Worms** – the smallest and most slender of the three Rhenish Imperial Cathedrals • **“Heiliger Sand” in Worms** – the oldest Jewish cemetery in Europe preserved on its original site • **Einhardbasilika in Seligenstadt** – one of the most important churches of the Carolingian period on German soil • **Kurhaus and Kurkolonnade in Wiesbaden** – at 129 m, the longest columned hall in Europe • **Russisch-Orthodoxe Kirche der Heiligen Elisabeth in Wiesbaden** – built on the model of Church of the Saviour in Moscow • **Kloster Eberbach in Eltville am Rhein** – with its Romanesque and Early Gothic buildings the former Cistercian abbey is among the most prominent monuments of European art • **Basilika St. Ägidius in Oestrich-Winkel** – the oldest church in the Rheingau alongside the abbey church of Eberbach

line the Museumsufer in Frankfurt am Main alone. The particularly high concentration of internationally renowned exhibition venues makes the banks of the Main one of the world's foremost museum locations. It is also home to the Städelsches Kunstinstitut, Germany's oldest and most renowned museum foundation, which exhibits art from the 14th century to the present day. Also located here are the Liebieghaus Skulpturensammlung, one of the world's leading sculpture museums, and the German Architecture Museum. Beyond the Museumsufer, Frankfurt am Main is home to other major exhibition venues such as the Schirn Kunsthalle in the Old Town. The Senckenberg Natural History Museum in the Westend-Süd district is the largest natural history museum in Germany and features one of the most extensive exhibitions of large dinosaur groups in Europe.

Other well-known exhibition venues in the metropolitan region:

Landesmuseum Mainz – one of the oldest museums in Germany • **Gutenberg Museum in Mainz** – one of the oldest museums of printing and writing in the world • **Museum Wiesbaden** – one of the foremost collections of 19th- and 20th-century art • **Deutsches Ledermuseum in Offenbach am Main** – a unique collection of objects made of leather and related materials from six millennia and five continents • **Kirchnerhaus Museum in Aschaffenburg** – the birthplace and documentation centre of Ernst Ludwig Kirchner, one of the leading figures of Expressionism • **Brüder Grimm Haus in Steinau an der Straße** – one of the largest and most important museums dedicated to the Brothers Grimm • **Hessisches Landesmuseum Darmstadt** – one of the oldest public museums in Germany • **Keltenwelt am Glauberg in Glauburg** – original finds from the princely tombs dating to the 5th century BC

UNESCO World Heritage Sites

FrankfurtRheinMain is also home to UNESCO World Heritage Sites, including the **Messel Pit**, a former oil shale quarry, where exceptionally well-preserved fossils have been discovered. The most famous among them: the prehistoric horse. The most recent addition is the **Mathildenhöhe in Darmstadt**, which was included in the UNESCO World Heritage List in 2021. It is the most valuable surviving Art Nouveau ensemble in Germany and an important precursor to the Bauhaus. **Kloster Lorsch** in the town of the same name is a former Benedictine abbey that served as a centre of power, learning, and scholarship well into the High Middle Ages. The **SchUM sites** preserve exceptional early and uniquely well-preserved evidence of a living Jewish tradition in Speyer, Worms, and Mainz. The **Limes** is also a UNESCO World Heritage Site and runs through FrankfurtRheinMain. The **Upper Middle Rhine Valley** also holds World Heritage status as the epitome of Rhine Romanticism and for its outstanding architectural monuments.

In addition, there is the **UNESCO Geopark Bergstraße-Odenwald**, which covers an area of 3,800 km² as well as two UNESCO Memory of the World documents: the **Golden Bull** (the most important constitutional document of the Holy Roman Empire from 1356 to 1806, which regulated the election and coronation of the Roman-German kings) and the **Constitutio Antoniniana** (an early grant of Roman citizenship dating from 212/213).

29.6 million overnight stays

were recorded in our metropolitan region in 2024. In the same year, **14.4** million guest arrivals were recorded; the average stay was **2.0** days. **24.5%** of guests came from abroad.

Discover industrial heritage and traditional crafts



Industry has traditionally played a key role in driving economic growth, innovation, employment, and prosperity in Frankfurt-RheinMain. Around 1,000 sites of local, regional, and national importance form the "Route of Industrial Heritage Rhine-Main". From port and industrial facilities to bridges, railway stations, sewage treatment plants, workers' housing estates, and modern technology parks, the route brings the many living testimonies of industrial production into public awareness. The annual "Days of Industrial Heritage Rhine-Main" provide access to industrial heritage sites that are otherwise closed to the public.

Anyone interested in traditional crafts and wishing to watch true masters at work will find much to discover at the Hessenpark Open-Air Museum in Neu-Anspach. More than one hundred historic buildings illustrate village life in Hesse over past centuries and showcase the craftsmanship of a wide range of trades.

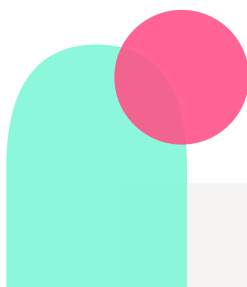
